Hanamatsuri: Time to Celebrate by Rev. Patti Nakai

The commemoration of the birth of the historical Buddha called Hanamatsuri ("Flower Festival") is a time to celebrate, to show appreciation for the Buddha and his teachings which have brought wisdom and compassion into our lives.

This year we hope to return to a full-blown Hanamatsuri service on Sunday April 17. However, we will need crews of volunteers to help with decorating the hanamido ("flower shrine"), set up the altar decorations, dress the o-chigo (children dressed as ancient Japanese royalty) and present the flower offerings for each temple unit. I hope this Hanamatsuri will signal a return to larger gatherings at our temple. Although we will stream this service as with all special services online at Facebook Live, we would like to see more folks on Sunday. Please don't take it for granted that we will continue to have Sunday services and other activities. It all depends on having enough volunteers to operate.

Also we hope to welcome new members by being open and accepting of all the people who come wanting to learn more about Buddhism. We live the Dharma of oneness and interconnection when we go outside our comfort zones and work with and get to know people from backgrounds different from ours. Ministerial Succession & Natsu Matsuri

You may wonder what ministerial succession and Natsu Matsuri have in common. The answer is Sangha involvement. As we slowly return to some semblance of normal, these two items demand our attention.

On March 6, the first meeting of the ministerial succession committee was held. Nineteen temple members attended both in person and on Zoom. Wendy Fawcett, our VP Temple Relations acted as the chairperson. The committee reviewed the projected budget needed for a full time resident minister. Based on these projections our current revenue would not cover this cost without drawing upon our reserve funds. Further discussions touched on a variety of items related to the qualifications we would want in a future minister and what our options might be if we cannot find a full time minister. The committee decided to hold meetings on the first Sunday of each month after service at 12:15. At the present time there are no potential candidates but a concerted outreach is planned. The committee felt it was of the utmost importance that the approach to the teachings that has been the BTC tradition must be maintained. Future meetings are open to all members; the Zoom login information is available from me or Rev. Patti.

It is unlikely that a full scale Natsu Matsuri with food and entertainment can occur this year. Although the pandemic seems to be diminishing, many people might not feel comfortable with the close quarters we find ourselves in at Natsu Matsuri. More importantly, many of the individuals who were responsible for making sure the food is properly prepared and running the kitchen operation are no longer able to do so. Unless a new generation of kitchen leaders is found we will not be able to have the selection of food items of previous festivals. We hope these new leaders will step forward so that the Natsu Matsuri tradition can continue. For this year, we are hoping to be able to have a presale and pickup teriyaki chicken day.

A temple is only as strong as its membership. For over 77 years, BTC has flourished thanks to the hard work and dedication of its members. Unfortunately, many of the members who made Natsu Matsuri possible are no longer able to do so. The future of Natsu Matsuri, and the future of the temple, is up to the members. With gratitude to those who came before it is time for the new group of leaders to step forward.
