Many nice Japanese inspired crafts were on display at the Buddhist Temple of Chicago Exhibit this year. The highlight of the show was the queen size Japanese quilt made by Jenny Watanabe. Other unique pieces made by people affiliated with BTC were the wonderful quilt pieces by Ritsuko Inouye. Each piece has a story to tell. Ritsuko's kimono quilt is made for birthdays. If it is the celebrant's 88th birthday the number of fabric pieces in the kimono is 88.

Mr. Frog was made by Shizue Nakanishi, colorful clay flowers and painting by Fumi Takata, Jane Ike worked in clay to make the delightful friends' candleholder. Also exhibited were Ruth Abbinanti's lovely turquoise bead bracelet, Michio Iwao's wood bird pins, Betty Yoshioka's knitted deer, precious jewelry by Frances Paltzwaldt and the cute towel rabbit by Ikue Matsuda.

Unusual creations were, the pretty soap flower sculptures, pasta flower hanging, and various unusual jewelry pieces. Distinguished artists treasures included Akemi Nakano Cohn's Remembrance #9, katazome embroidery, picture and scarfs, Donna Kato's beautiful items made with Kato clay, a process she invented, and Art Towata's dragonfly pendant.

Natsu Matsuri Returns by Bill Bohlman, Temple President

After a four year absence, Natsu Matsuri returned as a complete event. Last year we had the food aspect but not the other parts. This year along with the food we had vendors, performances and a cultural display. The reason we could do all this is simple: a dedicated sangha.

During the week before the festival the temple was transformed from its usual layout into one that accommodated the Natsu Matsuri activities. Walls were moved, a stage was built, chairs and tables were set up. By the time the weekend rolled around everything was in place.

Early Saturday morning preparations began. In the kitchen a group of volunteers were busy chopping and preparing all the ingredients for the chicken dinners, inari and udon. Throughout the morning they worked diligently to make sure that everything was ready for Sunday. Outside, the chicken crew was busy building the grill pit while waiting for the chickens to arrive. Finally, at 11 AM, the chickens arrived and the crew swung into action. Almost 700 chicken halves were trimmed, bagged and bathed in our special teriyaki marinade.

Sunday was the big day. Team Teriyaki arrived early and began the process of cooking the chickens. Rack after rack was filled with chickens and began their march down the grill pit. Inside the kitchen was in full swing. Pot after pot of rice eventually became inari at the skilled hands of some of the temple ladies. Working efficiently they produced over 350 servings of inari each with three pieces. Throughout the day the kitchen turned out order after order of chicken and udon.

This year, the festival attendees got to watch some wonderful exhibitions. Taiko did interactive audience participation. Aikido, Iaido and Kyudo demonstrations showcased these forms of martial arts. Throughout the day people enjoyed the beautiful items for sale by the vendors and the cultural exhibit of Japanese Creativity.

Natsu Matsuri this year was as successful as we could have hoped. However, each year it becomes harder to have the staffing we need. Unfortunately we do not have many younger people involved with the festival. As is the case with the temple in general we need the next generation to step forward. With gratitude to all those who helped, and with hope for the future, thank you for your dedication.
