A new administrator (Bishop) and spiritual leader (Rinban) will have taken charge. His name is Kenjun Kawawata. He was my very first Dharma teacher. I wandered into his temple in West Covina, California and he welcomed and encouraged me every step of the way. Sometimes he had to give me some strong direction too! I was always the better for that. When interest was taken for me to enter into the ministry, he supported me at every step and turn. But really, it was his joy and love with which he spoke of the Dharma that really gave me the nurturing to grow and walk this path.

At the same time, our then current Bishop and Rinban, Noriaki Ito, stepped in to also guide my path. I owe him great gratitude for bringing my ministerial training to completion. Now Bishop and Rinban Ito is retiring after fifty years of being a minister. That is amazing really! I just celebrated fifty years of marriage, so I know this is a great accomplishment. His legacy is all the temples he has led and nurtured. He has always been supportive of BTC. He has always advised me to do whatever will help build and encourage you all, even if it is different from traditional norms. I hope all of you will join me in wishing Bishop Ito great joy and happiness in his retirement and that he continues in a freer way to be a spiritual guide and exemplar of living the Buddhist and Jodo Shinshu way of life.

And now we welcome our new Bishop and Rinban Kenjun Kawawata. After serving many years in our district, at our Betsuin and later the West Covina Buddhist Temple, he had been made Bishop and Rinban of our Hawaii District, headquartered in Honolulu, Hawaii, and now he is coming back to the Mainland to be with all of us. You may not know this but our own past minister, Rev. Saito, was a student of Rev. Akegarasu and the other lights of the school of Kiyozawa. Rev. Saito was a teacher of both Revs. Ito and Kawawata, and became their Bishop and Rinban while in California. Rev. Saito was greatly loved by them as by all at BTC. So, we share much in common with Revs. Ito and Kawawata, and they with us. Let us continue to walk together in this unity of our great spiritual tradition whether we say hello or goodbye. That is why Aloha, from Hawaii, is such a lovely word. It takes hello and goodbye and brings a deeper unity between both.

Happy Birthday to Us Bill Bohlman, Temple President

Another year, another anniversary. As we mark our eighty-first anniversary, we look back with gratitude for all the sacrifices of those who came before and look forward with anticipation for things to come.

In 1944, Rev. Gyomay Kubose and a group of dedicated sangha members founded what was then called the Chicago Buddhist Church on the Southside. Times were difficult; the war was still raging and discrimination was rampant. Many of the sangha had recently come to Chicago from the internment camps and were starting from virtually nothing. However, regardless of their personal hardships they devoted time and resources to their new temple. The temple was more than a place to hear the Dharma; it was a place where the Dharma came alive. The temple was a cultural and social touchpoint of their lives. It is because of these early dedicated, sangha members that we have the temple we have today.

What is the future of BTC? Who will be the dedicated sangha members in the years to come? Right now, we are financially stable. However, with the additional expenses we will incur with a new resident minister our reserves may begin to dwindle. The question of how to proceed with the old residence building is due to be resolved this year. These are financial issues, but more important is the question of sangha involvement.

I have been coming to BTC for thirty-five years. During this time, I have seen many changes; most notably the makeup of those who attend Sunday service on a regular basis. Every year, the number of long-time family members in attendance seems to decline. Even on Shotsuki Hoyo Sundays there are only a few members there to honor their loved ones. We are hoping to have a new resident minister sometime in 2026. Will this new minister be the answer to the declining Sunday attendance, or will they find a disinterested sangha? For the last two years since Rev. Patti's retirement, Rev. Fred and a small group of dedicated members have made sure that we have service every Sunday. Who will be there to support the new minister in the years to come?

As we mark another year, we are grateful for the continued financial support of the members and friends. But a temple needs more than money, it needs an involved sangha. Let's all work to build on the strong foundation we have been given.
